- (v) A general understanding about how knowledge of politics and how that can be applied to benefit the management and/or amendment of problems of mankind.
- (vi) Capability to articulate ideas in appropriate manner.
- (vii) Sensitivity towards diverse contexts, ethnic groups, minorities, marginalized groups and gender issues.

Semester-wise Course Curricula

1. In Semester I & II student may take one course (06 credits) from Political Science as a major subject for a certificate in faculty of Arts.
2. In Semester III & IV Student may take one course (06 credits) from Political Science as a major subject for a diploma in faculty of Arts.
4. In semester V & VI two courses (05 credits each) are offered for 3 years UG Degree in faculty of Arts.
5. In semester VII & VIII 04 courses are offered (05 credits each) for 4 year UG Degree Hon's & 4 year UG Degree Hon's & Research.
6. But students those who secure a minimum of 75% marks (CGPA 7.5) in First Six Semesters and opt for 4 years Degree Hon's with Research, in VIII semester they will require to take only 2 theory courses (05 credit each) & they will complete a Research Project of 8 credits.
